California CD25 Immigration Survey Topline Results

Magellan Strategies are pleased to present the topline results for a 726n autodial survey of likely general election voters in California Congressional District 25. The interviews were conducted October 28th and 29th, 2013. This survey has a margin of error of +/- 3.63% at the 95 percent confidence interval. This survey was weighted based upon past voter turnout demographics.

T1. Are you registered to vote as a Republican, a Democrat or an Independent voter?

T4. As you may know, the House of Representatives is beginning to consider different immigration reform proposals. One option is legislation that would significantly increase border security, block employers from hiring undocumented immigrants, and make sure that undocumented immigrants already in the U.S. with no criminal record register for legal status. If immigrants were to meet a list of requirements, they could eventually apply for citizenship. Knowing this information, would you support or oppose this legislation?

Survey Methodology

This survey was conducted using automated telephone touchtone technology. The sample used for this survey was randomly drawn from a California CD25 voter file. The survey response data was weighted based upon voting demographics from past California CD25 general election cycles. The interviews were conducted on October 28th and 29th, 2013. Three attempts were made to interview each household in the sample. This survey has a margin of error of 3.63% at the 95 percent confidence interval.
