California CD21 Immigration Survey Topline Results

Magellan Strategies are pleased to present the topline results for a 573n autodial survey including cell phones of likely general election voters in California Congressional District 21. The interviews were conducted October 7th and 8th, 2013. This survey has a margin of error of +/- 4.09% at the 95 percent confidence interval. This survey was weighted based upon past voter turnout demographics.

T1. Are you registered to vote as a Republican, a Democrat or an independent voter?

Survey Methodology

This survey was conducted using automated telephone touchtone technology, as well as live dialing cell phones. The sample used for this survey was randomly drawn from a California CD21 voter file. The survey response data was weighted based upon voting demographics from past California CD21 general election cycles. The interviews were conducted on October 7th and 8th, 2013. Three attempts were made to interview each household in the sample. This survey has a margin of error of 4.09% at the 95 percent confidence interval.
